Session 9, Public and Private Partnering: The College of Charleston and the South Carolina Historical Society Archives

In December 2014, the South Carolina Historical Society relocated nearly 5,000 linear feet of manuscript material and more than 3,000 rare books and monographs to a shared space within the Special Collections department at the College of Charleston's Addlestone Library. Panelists will discuss the antecedents and recent evolution of this partnership between a private non-profit manuscript archives and a public academic repository and share lessons learned from the process of reallocating and re-purposing archival spaces including vaults, a shared service desk, and processing space.
